

Westchester Kennel Club Dog Show Next Sunday

Among the 2,938 dogs of 118 breeds and varieties entered at the 51st annual all-breed dog show of the Westchester Kennel Club, Sunday, September 8, no fewer than 500 in 90 breeds are Champions of Record—the elite of pure-bred dogdom.

The show will be held on a new location, Croton Point Park, jutting into the Hudson River from Harmon on Hudson. There will be grassy area for rings and tents, and additional area for parking. The show continues its unbenched format with ample tents next to, and sheltering part of each ring. Croton Point Park is generously provided with permanent comfort, catering, and picnic facilities, and well supplied with trees for shade. Complimentary chairs are provided at all rings. Children are welcome.

In addition to breed-by-breed judging, there are nine classes of obedience competition conducted by the Port Chester O.T.C. where seven judges will be comparing the dog's ability to carry out the instructions of their handlers in prescribed exercises. In the afternoon, there will be Junior Showmanship classes in which boys and girls from 10 to 16 years of age demonstrate their skills at handling dogs in conformation competition.

The beneficiaries will be the Westchester Adoption Service of White Plains, through which more than 1000 children have found good homes, and the Croton Point Choral Society, whose summer season closed on Labor Day weekend before the Westchester dog show.

Pfc. Paul Abel Awarded Combat Infantry Badge

Ban Me Thout, Vietnam (AHTNC)—The Combat Infantryman Badge, mark of distinction for the fighting soldier, was awarded to Army Private First Class Paul F. Abel near Ban Me Thout, Vietnam, August 11.

Pvt. Abel, son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul F. Abel, 291 Rye Beach Avenue, is assigned to Company A, 2d Battalion of the 4th Infantry Division's 35th Infantry as a rifleman.

CIBs have been awarded since late in World War II for sustained contact against an enemy in ground action. The badge is a blue rectangle with a silver rifle mounted on it and a curved wreath at the top. Subsequent awards are represented by stars in the center of the wreath.

He entered the Army in November, 1967, completed basic training at Ft. Jackson, S. C., and was last stationed at Ft. Polk, La., before arriving overseas in April, 1968. The 19-year-old soldier graduated in 1967 from Rye High School.
