"The door would legally be open to apartments on Forest Avenue if Mr. Grainger's latest proposal is approved", stated Councilman Thomas A. Butler, Democratic candidate for mayor, at the home of Vincent Gorman, 360 Forest Ave-

Mr. Butler said that his opponent's recommendation to rezone Ward's Park for apartment use, if approved, would set a precedent for the zoning of other Forest Avenue properties for the same use, thus permitting more hi-rise apartments.

"Mr. Grainger advocated and voted for hi-rise apartments on Milton Harbor," Mr. Butler said, "and it appears that he has similar plans for our other shorefront." Mr. Butler explained that the rezoning proposal was made as an alternative to urban renewal in the Beck-Wainwright area. The new proposal would simply increase the population density in the area and thus aggravate an already serious problem.

Mr. Butler urged his opponent to reconsider his position and refrain from taking any action which would convert Forest Avenue into "Apartment House".


