### Attended Seminar In Puerto Rico

Tickets, which are \$1.00 for students and \$1.50 for adults are available at the High School and at the door. All proceeds from the evening will help support next year's High School American Field Service student.

## Rye Garden Club Holds Conservation Meeting

Members of the Rye Garden Club met for a Conservation Meeting and house-plant exchange on Tuesday at the home of Mrs. J. B. Jenkins of Highland Road. Mrs. Frederick H. Hibberd, conservation chairman, showed two sound films, in color, called "Wetlands are not Wastelands" and "Yours for a Song."

The first film graphically depicted the necessity of marshlands for the preservation of wild-life, birds as well as denizens of salt water and fresh lakes, rivers and ponds, and pointed out that draining or filling in wetlands for building purposes can actually harm a community.

"Yours for a Song" showed a bird sanctuary in Connecticut in a private "back yard," where hundreds of wild birds of many species, were attracted by just three basic things—shelter, food and water. Revealed also were the many varieties of evergreens, shrubs and plants, as well as brush piles and sheltering thickets that lure birds at different seasons of the year and offer them protection and safety.

Mrs. Frank O. Sandstrom, president, said that the Rye Garden Club planned to publish a conservation list of plants and flowers that should not be cut or picked.

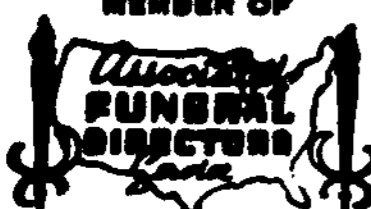
