JEAN CRAWFORD WINS APAWAMIS LADIES' GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP

Jean Ashley Crawford, 30-year-
old golfing star, bride of just two
months and tournament medalist
(with an 82) eked out a victory in
a links battle that went right down
to the last putt over beloved many
times champion Sis (Mrs. Allison)
Choate 1 up in the 36-hole match
play final of the Ladies Champion-
ship played at the Apawamis Club's
5779-yard, ladies par-74, course
last Friday.

She carded a 76 on the morning
round and a 78 on the second 18.
Commented Jean, "I was really
happy to win this one as it's the
first time I've been able to beat Sis
since I started playing at Apa-
wamis."

The match was the climax of the
Apawamis Women's Club Cham-
pionship, a tournament which also
saw Mrs. John F. Tobin win the
First Flight title after defeating
Mrs. Sam R. Watkins, and Mrs.
John F. Finnegan become cham-
pion of the Second Flight as a re-
sult of her match with Mrs. John
Roebuck.

Three-time member of the Wom-
en's Curtis Cup team which won
over the British in 1962, 1966 and
1968, Mrs. Crawford, who (with
her husband Charles) recently
moved to New York City from her
native Chanute, Kansas, was the
United States Women's Amateur
Champion in 1965 and twice was
Runnerup for this title—in 1960
and 1967. Kansas State Women's
Titleholder in 1955 and again in
1961, Jean also took her home club
championship at the Chanute Coun-
try Club on many occasions.

Sis Choate, whose consistently
brilliant game has brought her
countless titles and belies her 59
years of age said, "To be able to
make the match as close as it was
gave me a big thrill." Mrs. Choate
started winning the Apawamis
Ladies Golf Championship back in
1935 and has captured the trophy
twenty times. She was the U.S.G.A.
Senior Champion in 1963 and has
held the U. S. Women's Senior
crown in 4 out of the last 5 years.
The long-time Apawamis golfing
great not only encouraged the
young Kansas stylist to join Apa-
wamis but was also instrumental
in getting another lady golfer of
superior caliber to become a mem-
ber—Barbara Bruning McGhie, a
former New York State Champion
and holder of many other titles.
Both these talented shotmakers
wrested the Aawamis crown from
Mrs. Choate causing her to re-
mark philosophically, "Even though
these young golfing 'wiz-kids' bring
me down in flames, it's marvelous
to have such top-flight women
golfers at Apawamis with Barbara
still here, too."

Jean Crawford's husband, a left-
handed former intercollegiate ten-
nis doubles champion himself, said,
"I guess I'll have to take up golf
but the trouble is I can't decide
whether to play the game left-
handed or right-handed. Either way
it will be tough to beat Jean."
2 down on the 34th tee in the

finals against Mrs. Crawford, Sis
Choate won the hole with a par 3
to Jean's bogey 4 and went to the
35th tee only 1 down. Both finalists
took pars on the long 17th-hole
and the eventual winner remained
1 up as they teed off on the 18th
hole. A par 4 on this final hole by
Mrs. Choate was equalled by Mrs.
Crawford which gave Jean the
match by a 1 up score.

To reach the final round Mrs.
Crawford defeated Marilyn (Mrs.
Thornton) Gerrish 4 and 2—closing
out the match with a birdie 2 on
the par 3 16th hole to Mrs. Gerrish's
par 3.

The defending champion Pan
(Mrs. Robert) Estes, in the other
semi-final round match, held a 1
up lead over Sis Choate after the
16th hole. They halved the long
par-5 17th and Mrs. Estes was still
1 up on the 18th tee. Mrs. Choate
won this hole with a par 4 which
evened the match and forced it
into extra holes. Her 5 on the 19th
hole brought her victory.

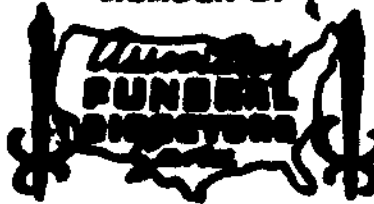
