

**:-: Gateway to Nature :-:**

A friendly rabbit will lend a foot or four in an informal program to originate at the Rye Nature Center, at 2 p.m., Sunday, Jan. 18. Herring dog and cat interference, he will lead a snow-track safari of those who come properly booted. Tracks of a porky bob-white, starling, a proud rooster, and other animals frequenting the feeding area will be studied.

Appropriately, articles concerning ecology, conservation, and our environment are making front page and editorial news. Locally, in a previous article concerning hunting, the necessity of good eyesight and extensive clay-pigeon target practice was emphasized. As a direct result of one or both of these deficiencies, a female Canadian goose, using its bleeding wings as arms, crawled to the home of Mrs. Frank Carroll appealing for help or the inevitable. Rye Nature Center was notified; the goose was picked up without a struggle, fed, and encouraged by neighborly bob-white,

a rooster, and a nonchalant guinea fowl. Inspection indicated extensive shot damage, besides broken legs.

Rye Conservation Commission Chairman John H. Albert and fellow Commissioner Hobart L. Reynolds helped in first aid, but damage was too extensive. Harbormaster George W. DePauw suggested the help of Jane Lawrence (who will present our next program) and Capt. Horst of the Wildlife Restoration Ass'n. Finally, Dr. Richard Rashbaum of Mt. Vernon was recommended. His examination confirmed that the shot damaged the body and wings and broke both legs. He hopes to save the trusting wildlife despite the extensive damage. While total compassion can create problems, it is necessary to balance the failing, dispassionate efforts of totally scientific conservationists.

An attempt to locate the new comet Tago-Sato-Kosaka will be made this Saturday at 6 p.m. at the Center parking area.

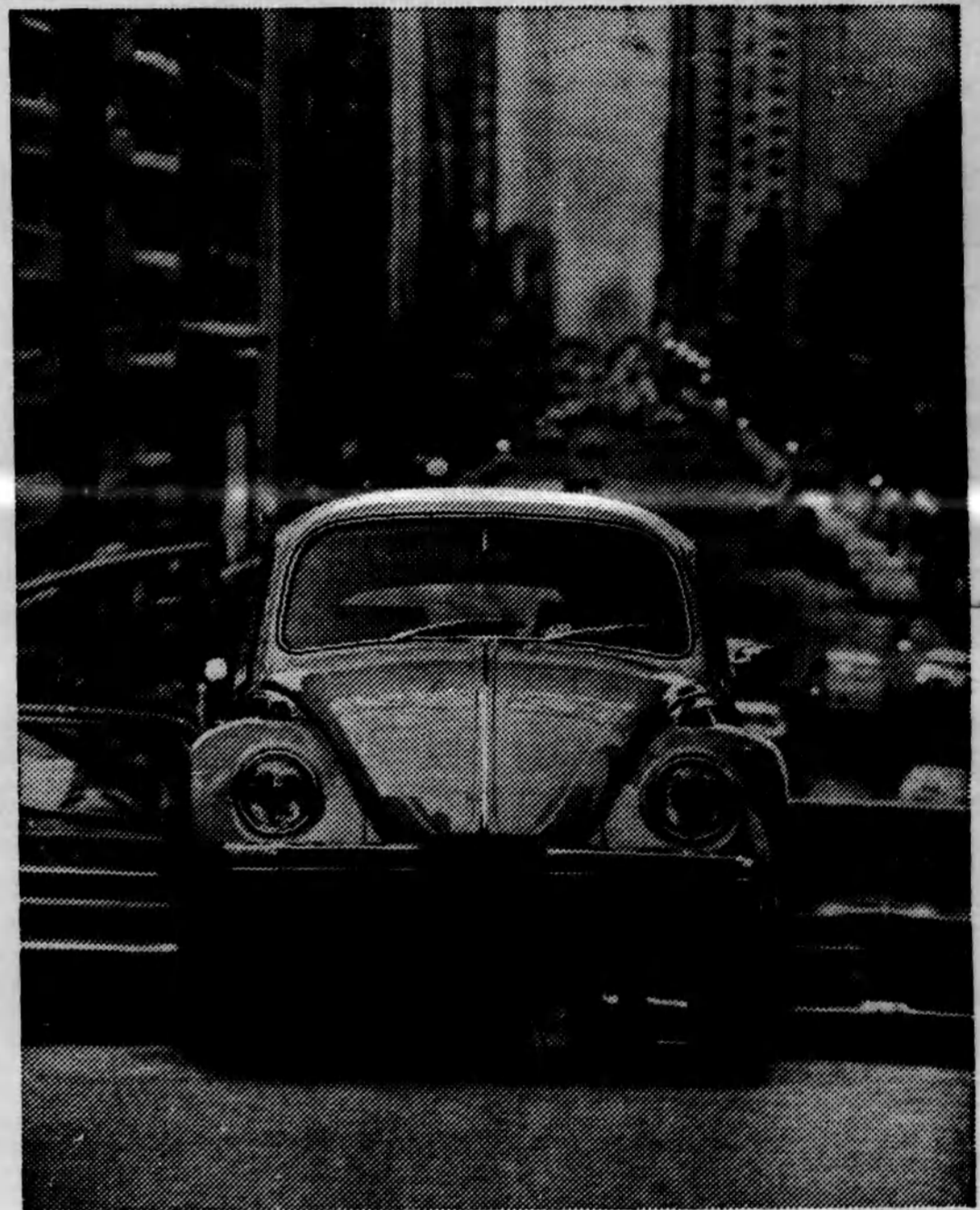
