Rye Cleanup Week Starting April 29

The City of Rye has scheduled a spring cleanup week for the period April 29 to May 4, both inclusive. During this week, the Department of Public Works will pick up rubbish and yard accumulations from residences in the city. The purpose of this program is to dispose of rubbish and other waste materials that have accumulated in homes and on properties during the winter and early spring months.

Rubbish must be placed adjacent to the curb or near the street pavement in front of homes. Since formed to provide specialists in in- at United Hospital in Port Chester, mittee of Grasslands. trucks will be manned by only two men, items that are too large or too heavy for two men to load onto a truck will not be collected. Small, loose material must be placed in containers. If these containers are not to be taken as part of the cleanup program, they should be plainly marked accordingly. Residents who have accumulated leaves in the process of cleaning their; yards should place them in containers. Large plastic bags are available at most hardware stores and are well suited for this purpose. Tree limbs and branches will be collected if they are cut into three-foot lengths and tied into bundles.

Public Works trucks will tour the entire City each day. Residents may, therefore, place material for collection on any day during the week. Since, however, the last day of the program will be Saturday, May 4, rubbish desired to be picked; up that day should be in place the night before.

If a City truck inadvertently misses any rubbish that has been available for collection for a period of 24 hours, the Department of Public Works should be called at 967-1686 or 967-5400.
