SHALL BE SEIZED ON OR OFF PREMISES

The New York State Agriculture and Markets Law requires every dog to be licensed annually and to wear the metal license tag issued. If the tag is not worn the dog is subject to seizure and, if not redeemed, may be sold or destroyed. Puppies, upon becoming six months of age must be licensed also.

Licenses can be obtained at the Office of the City Clerk, City Hall, Rye, New York, either by mail or in person.
