## REPUBLICANS SAY DEMOCRATS UNABLE TO RAISE REAL ISSUE

The Rye Golf Club, City taxes, and the proposed Rye Oyster Bay Bridge were topics of discussion at a coffee for some sixty people held recently at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Norbert Neumann of Loudon

Woods, where Republican candidates urged the continuation of the present administration in Rye.

Frank Begrish, Frederick Hunziker, Jr., and Edmund Sullivan, Jr., Republican candidates for City Council, cited the accomplishments of the incumbent Republicans and stated that their opponents had been unable to raise any real issues.

Mr. Hunziker denied the Democrats' charge of mismanagement at the Rye Golf Club and deplored their "panacea" for solving the deficit problem. Pointing out that all

Many parents have commented that there is practically no communication between parents, students and administration. It is hoped this series will bridge the gap.

Today Rye Country Day School celebrates its one hundredth anniversary. The School, located at the intersection of the Boston Post Road and the New England Thruway, began to take shape in 1869.

A small group of parents in Rye concerned with the quality of education available to their children began to take steps to improve it. Hearing of the sound reputation of The Reverend and Mrs. William Life and their small parish school in Muncy, Pa., the Rye parents invited the Lifes to move to Rye and start a new school. They accepted and soon the Rye Female Seminary opened its doors with an enrollment of sixty girls. Through the gener-

## SCHOOL BOARD GIVES REASONS FOR WANTING MIDDLE SCHOOL

Enrollment in the Rye school system this fall has reached an all-time high of 3,089 pupils, Mrs. Winona Banister, president of the Board of Education said Tuesday night at the board's meeting of the High School.

She said the board has already

reviewed four sets of preliminary plans for the proposed Middle School to be built at Osborn and Theall Roads on land which the board is presently negotiating to purchase from the Miriam Osborn Memorial Home. Emilio Di Rienzo of Mount Vernon is the architect for the Middle School project.

"We are crowded in the Rye school system now," she said, pointing out that the board has been aware for a number of years of overcrowding in the schools.

Board member, Dr. John Gundy observed that the decision of the need for a separate middle school has been unanimous on the board.

Figures released by the board Tuesday night show an increase of 123 students over last year's enrollment of 2,966 in the kindergarten through 12th grade.
