Ambassador Yost Speaker

Acting Mayor Stanley Keyes introduced the guest speaker, Ambassador Charles W. Yost, permanent representative from the United States to the United Nations.

Speaking on "The Future of the United Nations," Ambassador Yost pointed out that the world as it was is no longer so. General war is impossible, and, he went on, alternatives are essential.

Thus—there is a real need for the United Nations. Much has been done in the UN, but there is so much more to do. The UN, nevertheless, is not a superstate. It can not solve all problems, since it has limited powers. It has no real physical power, that is, a full-scale armed force."

The United Nations should, and does, perform certain essential tasks where, Ambassador Yost said, it does act with some authority, but in the future, he asserted, it must act more. He listed its tasks as follows:

Disarmament — All the UN can do is recommend a treaty on non-proliferation of weapons. There

is pressure to do more; that is, to hold a Disarmament Conference.

2. De-colonization — The UN must handle explosive areas in the southern half of Africa.

3. Under-developed countries — The task is to accelerate the process of lifting the standard of living; to narrow the gap between these countries and the United States by providing, for example, technicians, or by training native technicians.

4. To keep the peace — The UN must act as the dynamic instrument of peace keeping.

To sum it up, Ambassador Yost believes that a great deal must be done in the UN. There is a future for the UN if man gives it a future, he said. Despite obstacles and problems, these can be overcome by persistence, patience, and the spirit of understanding and conciliation.

Following the address, Mrs. Arthur Evers, president of the Rye Council of United Church Women, gave the World Community Day message. The Rev. Wendell Phillips delivered the benediction.

An informal reception was held in the Guild Room where representatives from the host church, served as well as representatives from the member churches of The Rye Council of United Church Women.

where he will be stationed at Bent Waters Air Force Base near Ipswich. He will be flying the F4C, or Phantom Two jet.

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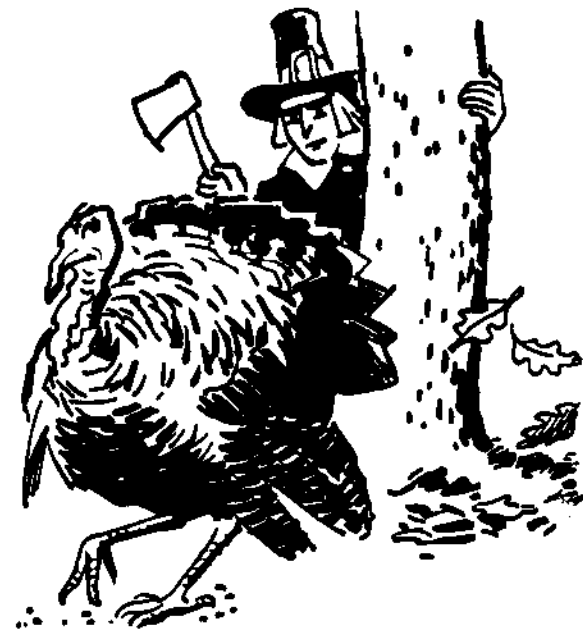


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
