The increase will enable the of salary and wage contracts signed recently with school employees without reducing school facilities and the educational program.

Costs in the Rye school system have increased about \$104,000 for added personnel, and \$380,000 in additional pay for teachers now on the staff. The incrase includes \$101,000 for social security, retirement fund payments and other mandated employee benefits.

According to State law, a city school district is permitted maximum taxation in the amount of two percent of the five year average of the true value of taxable property within the district. Increases are only permitted at the rate of .25 percent per referendum. Through passage of the referen-

Rye has earned a special award from the American Automobile Association for its exceptional pedestrian program.

The award was presented Friday to Mayor Edmund Grainger Jr. and Police Chief Charles G. McLaughlin at a luncheon ceremony in the Penn Top Room of the Statler Hilton Hotel in New York City. New York State Commissioner of Motor Vehicles Vincent L. Tofany made the presentations to representatives of 54 award-winning communities in the area served by the Automobile Club of New York. The Club is the local affiliate of AAA, which conducts the annual Pedestrian Safety Inventory Program.

Rye won the Pedestrian Safety Citation for six years without a pedestrian fatality.
