Previous to joining the Army, Lt. Griffin was employed by American Telephone and Telegraph Company, long lines, New York.

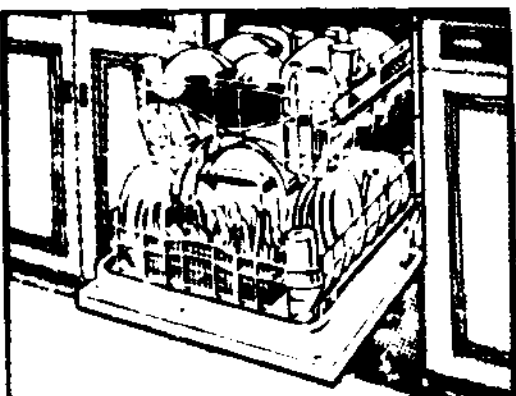
City Purchasing Lots

Rye Women Voters Would Remove Choice of Judges From Political Arena

Mrs. Solomon Hurwitz, president of the Rye League of Women Voters, announced today that the League of Women Voters welcomes new evidence of strong bi-partisan support among the State's political leaders for reform in the way judges are chosen.

She stated, "The leaders of the two major parties are now firmly on record in support of judicial reform. We are urging them to exert strong leadership with members of their parties in the Legislature, since a Constitutional amendment is required before reform can be

achieved." As a result of the studies of local Leagues, she indicated, "We advocate adoption of a merit selection plan."

Under this system, non-partisan nominating commissions, composed of lawyers and laymen, submit slates of names to the chief executive, who must make an appointment from the list. After the judge has served for a minimum term, generally two or three years, he "runs on his record."

The League of Women Voters believe the merit selection system, now used in nine States, and supported by the American Bar Association, the American Judicature Society and civic organizations throughout the country, is the me-

thod which should be used in New York to remove the selection of judges from the political arena and to assure the highest caliber of judges in our courts.

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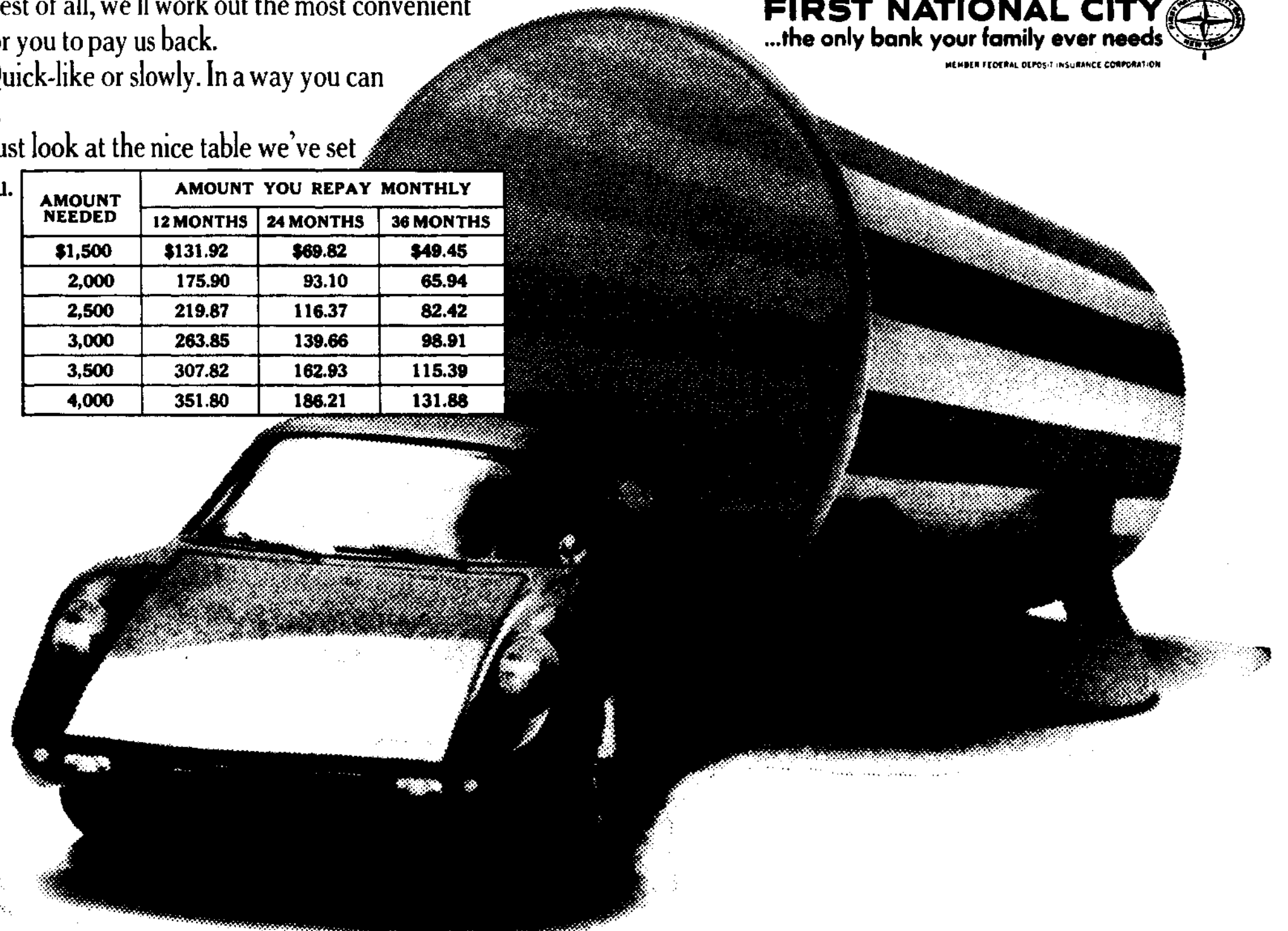
